WORD OF GOD

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching and song.

his evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another.

Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.



FIRST READING

Exodus 12:1-14

THE PASSOVER OF THE LORD

Israel remembered its deliverance from slavery in Egypt by celebrating the festival of Passover. This festival featured the Passover lamb, whose blood was used as a sign to protect God's people from the threat of death. The early church described the Lord's supper using imagery from the Passover, especially in portraying Jesus as the lamb who delivers God's people from sin and death.

he Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt,

²"This month will be the first month; it will be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the whole Israelite community: On the tenth day of this month they must take a lamb for each household, a lamb per house. 4If a household is too small for a lamb, it should share one with a neighbor nearby. You should divide the lamb in proportion to the number of people who will be eating it. 5Your lamb should be a flawless year-old male. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats. 6You should keep close watch over it until the fourteenth day of this month. At twilight on that day, the whole assembled Israelite community should slaughter their lambs. 7They should take some of the blood and smear it on the two doorposts and on the beam over the door of the houses in which they are eating. 8That same night they should eat the meat roasted over the fire. They should eat it along with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. 9Don't eat any

of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over fire with its head, legs, and internal organs. 10 Don't let any of it remain until morning, and burn any of it left over in the morning. 11This is how you should eat it. You should be dressed, with your sandals on your feet and your walking stick in your hand. You should eat the meal in a hurry. It is the Passover of the Lord. 12 I'll pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I'll strike down every oldest child in the land of Egypt, both humans and animals. I'll impose judgments on all the gods of Egypt. I am the Lord. 13The blood will be your sign on the houses where you live. Whenever I see the blood, I'll pass over you. No plague will destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.


14"This day will be a day of remembering for you. You will observe it as a festival to the Lord. You will observe it in every generation as a regulation for all time."

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

PROCLAIM THE LORD'S DEATH UNTIL HE COMES

In the bread and cup of the Lord's supper, we experience intimate fellowship with Christ and with one another because it involves his body given for us and the new covenant in his blood. Faithful participation in this meal is a living proclamation of Christ's death until he comes in the future.

"This is my body, which is for you; do this to remember me."

THE HOLY GOSPEL

John 13:1-17, 31-35

THE SERVICE OF CHRIST: FOOTWASHING AND MEAL

The story of the last supper in John's gospel recalls a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere: Jesus performs the duty of a slave, washing the feet of his disciples and urging them to do the same for one other.

efore the Festival of Passover,
Jesus knew that his time had
come to leave this world and
go to the Father. Having loved
his own who were in the world, he loved
them fully.

²Jesus and his disciples were sharing the evening meal. The devil had already provoked Judas, Simon Iscariot's son, to betray Jesus. 3Jesus knew the Father had given everything into his hands and that he had come from God and was returning to God. 4So he got up from the table and took off his robes. Picking up a linen towel, he tied it around his waist. 5Then he poured water into a washbasin and began to wash the disciples' feet, drying them with the towel he was wearing. 6When Jesus came to Simon Peter, Peter said to him. "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷Jesus replied,

"You don't understand what I'm doing now, but you will understand later."

8"No!" Peter said. "You will never wash my feet!" Jesus replied,

> "Unless I wash you, you won't have a place with me."

⁹Simon Peter said, "Lord, not only my feet but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰Jesus responded,

"Those who have bathed need only to have their feet washed, because they are completely clean. You disciples are clean, but not every one of you."

¹¹He knew who would betray him. That's why he said, "Not every one of you is clean."

¹²After he washed the disciples' feet, he put on his robes and returned to his place at the table. He said to them,

"Do you know what I've done for you?

13 You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and
you speak correctly, because I am. 14 If
I, your Lord and teacher, have washed
your feet, you too must wash each
other's feet. 15 I have given you an
example: Just as I have done, you also
must do. 16 I assure you, servants aren't
greater than their master, nor are those
who are sent greater than the one who
sent them. 17 Since you know these
things, you will be happy if you do them."

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. 32If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify the Son of Man in himself and will glorify him immediately.

³³Little children, I'm with you for a little while longer. You will look for me—

'Where I'm going, you can't come.'

³⁴"I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you also must love each other. ³⁵This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other."

Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks: broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: "Take and eat: this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me." For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Send your Holy Spirit, our advocate, to fill the hearts of all who share this bread and cup with courage and wisdom to pursue love and justice in all the world. **Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.**

Join our prayers and praise with your prophets and martyrs of every age, that, rejoicing in the hope of the resurrection, we might live in the freedom and hope of your Son.

Through him, with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirt, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, now and forever.

Amen.

THE LORD'S PRAYER


Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray:

COMMUNION BLESSING


(After all have returned to their seats, the minister will say:)
